

Focused on specific goal until the goal is achieved


Strategic

Learn and Burn Live-Fire Event

Increasing Prescribed Fire Capacity Through Mentoring

Increase your exposure and gain confidence in conducting prescribed fire operations in woodlands in this no-cost educational program.

TRAINING DETAILS:

Ten simultaneous prescribed burns will be conducted on the first available burn window between Feb. 12-16, 2018. Participants will attend the full day training. This training is organized by the Alabama Prescribed Fire Council in collaboration with other public and private organizations listed below. There are no costs for this program.

WHAT YOU WILL LEARN:

Attendees will experience this day-long, "start-to-finish" prescribed burn. Each participants will be assigned to a 10-person crew that will be managed by an experienced Alabama Certified prescribed burn manager. Participants will have access all day to observe, ask questions and EXPERIENCE igniting and holding a burn between 200-560 acres in a variety of fuel types, forest types and stand conditions.

LODGING:

Lodging can be found in Opelika, Eufala, Phenix City or Union Springs, AL.

REQUIREMENTS/WHO SHOULD APPLY:

Participants will be required to participate for the entire day and to sign a hold-harmless liability disclosure/waiver on the day of the event. Participants must expect to be active all day walking, wearing proper attire and using/carrying tools. Preference to those applicants who have completed a certified prescribed burner course.

*Depending on weather conditions, participants will be given 2 days advance notice before the program is held. 7:30 am-3:30 pm (CST) Lunch Provided





Incentives to Create and Maintain Partnerships






Partnership framework




Partnerships Evolve and End




Challenges for partnerships

- Expect delays!
- Maintaining key stakeholder engagement
 - High workloads
 - Time limitations
- Schedule compatibility for meeting
- Bring the program to existing social networks where stakeholders will already be
- Competition within the partnership
- Mission creep






Partnering with Private Industry


